USA NORTHERN ILLAWARRA FILM SOCIETY - TERM 1, 2019

Venue – Excelsior Hall, Thirroul Library and Community Centre, 12.30 – 3.30 each Wednesday during term commencing 30 January and concluding 28 March, 2018.

Co-ordinator: Rick Thompson. Visitors are welcome.

These sessions are about discussing the film(s), not simply watching them. A discussion follows each screening. Short films or excerpts may accompany some programs. Those films marked * will be screened with subtitles for the hard of hearing.

Jan 30 *My Man Godfrey* * (USA, 1936, 93 mins.) Directed by Gregory La Cava. With William Powell, Carole Lombard. Classic screwball comedy: a bizarre rich family hire a homeless man as their butler; the film then proceeds to toy with social realism themes.

Feb 6 *Waltz With Bashir* * (Israel, 2008, 90 ins.) Directed by Ari Folman. Very experimental animated film investigating the Israeli army's activities in the Lebanon war: two veterans try to sort out their memories thereof.

Feb 13 *The Blue Angel* * (Germany, 1930, 94 ins.) Directed by Josef von Sternberg. With Marlene Dietrich, Emil Jannings. Von Sternberg's first sound film climaxed the German Weimar cinema and made a star of Dietrich in this story of a puritanical schoolmaster who investigates nightclub life and becomes its victim. Regarded as a classic of early sound cinema.

Feb 20 *Modern Times* (USA, 1936, 87 mins.) Directed by Charles Chaplin. With Chaplin, Paulette Goddard. Eight years into the sound period, Chaplin directs and stars in this essentially silent investigation of the Great Depression and its class struggles.

Feb 27 *Point Blank* * (USA, 1967, 92 mins.) Directed by John Boorman. With Lee Marvin, Angie Dickinson. A central film in Hollywood's Neo-noir movement of the 1960s, the film follows Marvin as a double-crossed man making his violent way through a criminal corporation to get his money back. Violent.

Mar 6 *Shadow of a Doubt* * (USA, 1942, 103 mins.) Directed by Alfred Hitchcock. With Joseph Cotten, Teresa Wright. One of Hitchcock's first American films. A man with a past Cotten seeks shelter with his innocent niece, who begins to suspect him in this psychological thriller, one of Hitchcock's personal favourites..

Mar 13 *The Furies* (USA, 1950, 109 mins.) Directed by Anthony Mann. With Barbara Stanwyck, Walter Huston. Director Mann takes a fierce domestic melodrama — a determined daughter's feud with an equally determined father about who she can marry, who owns the ranch and related issues — and sets the film in the old West, moving the genre into a new direction.

Mar 20 *Sansho the Bailiff* * (Japan, 1954, 124 mins.) Directed by Kenji Mizoguchi. With Kinuyo Tanaka, Yoshiaki Hanayagi. Shifts in feudal Japanese politics force an abandoned governor's wife and children into a chaotic and cruel life threatened by, among other forces, slave traders. One of Mizoguchi's masterpieces.

Mar 27 *The Big Lebowski** (USA, 2005, 118 mins.) Directed by Joel Coen. With Jeff Bridges, John Goodman. Another cult hit from the Coen Brothers, scrambling thriller genre conventions into a modern comedy, tossing bowling buddies into kidnapping and much more.

April 3 – No showing due to the unavailability of the Hall.
